Members should bring their own instruments if possible. Some instruments, however, that are available through the group are: oboe, bassoon, french horn, baritone, tuba, bass clarinet, and percussion equipment.

**MATERIALS:**  
Music literature and music stands will be provided by the group.

**CONCERTS:**  
The CCCB expects to provide music for concerts in Lipinsky Auditorium, UNC-A Commencements, outdoor concerts on the UNC-A Mall, and for numerous other local events.
