If a student's interest is state government the Institute of Government Summer Intern Program in State Government provides a unique opportunity for 24 college students to learn how the North Carolina state government functions.

This intern program is not limited to students who are definitely headed for public service careers. Internships are full-time and last 10 weeks.

Participation is open to sophomores, juniors, and seniors currently enrolled in college who are either residents of NC or out-of-state students attending a NC college.

Applicants must have completed two years of college but not entered

graduate school as of May 1985.

Interns will be paid \$150 per week. Unmarried interns will live in group housing on the North Carolina State University campus. Last year the cost of the housing was \$175 per person for the summer.

To apply, complete one copy of the PD-107, Application for Employment form. These forms may be obtained from college placement offices, local offices of the Employment

Security Commission, or the Office of State Personnel in Raleigh.

Write an accompanying letter that includes your plans or ambitions; college activities and honors that are important to you personally; your reasons for wishing to participate in the program, including your expectations and potential contributions.

Include names and addresses of three academic references.

Also enclose a transcript of your college record.
