objectives. The very fact that Clark Kerr would come to UNCA says how good we are.

Humanities is one of your three "thrust areas." Would you explain the thrust program and how you decided which areas to concentrate on?

I decided to give some special aid to three to five subjects where UNCA might become distinctive throughout the state, the South, the nation, and maybe even internationally.

What does that mean? Very simply it means money. Next year the humanities

program will have \$50,000 to spend that it otherwise wouldn't have had, and that will be true the year after that. The two years after that the money will be cut back to \$25,000 extra.

The second thrust area is the undergraduate student institutional research program. They are planning to set up an internal foundation where students may apply for grants for research.

The third area is the health promotions area. This is a program that has already attracted attention from over 20 states

and several nations, and is one of the really neat things that is here.

In two years we will probably identify two other major areas of thrust.

What does the role of chancellor involve?

I'm a coach and a catalyst. I am clearly a communicator, bringing UNCA to the people.

I don't have as much authority as people think I have. It's just that all communication lines run through my office.

These greetings set the stage for the swearing-in. The Honorable Henry E. Frye, North Carolina Supreme Court Associate Justice, administered the oath, and Friday declared Brown the chancellor of UNCA.

Brown then delivered his first official speech.

"Long ago," said Brown, "universities in Cairo, Bologna, Paris, Heidelberg, and Oxford were the Great Enablers." They accommodated "the passage of wisdom among genera-

tions and across cultures. Today we join in the celebration of our own Great Enabler, the University of North Carolina at Asheville."

The primary sense, he said, in which the university has been an "enabler" lies in the "empowerment of human potential." UNCA's strategy for utilizing this potential lies in the phrase, "Where the Classics Build Careers."

"Effective public school teachers understand how

Socrates and Shakespeare taught," said Brown. "Knowing the basic principles of design and physics is a prerequisite for a quality architect."

"Corporate leaders understand that tribal differences in culture and language mandate different business decisions in say, Japan than in France," he continued.

"Our mission is to ground our students in the best thinking of the past," said Brown, empowering them not only to "enter a diversity of careers but, also to cope with a rapidly changing world."

The chancellor concluded his speech by accepting the position of chancellor "with the highest expectations for our destiny."

A benediction and recessional brought the ceremony to a close.
