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Center receives funding

The state legislature recently appropriated planning money for a 100,000-square-foot convention and conference center to be built on the UNCA campus.

The multi-purpose facility will be located on university land at Broadway and W.T. Weaver Boulevard and will house the N.C. Retirement Center. A recent \$500,000 appropriation from the General Assembly initiated the project. The final cost will range from \$11 to \$15 million, according to Wally Bowen, UNCA director of public information.


UNCA officials said the center will be similar to North Carolina State University's Jane S. McKimmon Center for Extension and Continuing Education. They estimate a 1991 completion date once construction funds are appropriated.

The proposed center will add greatly to the sense of a dynamic campus, said Bowen.

As a public liberal arts university, UNCA has a commitment to the lifelong process of learning, said Bowen. The Center for Retirement and its Senior Scholars program component will enhance the academic life at UNCA, increasing the opportunities for learning from very talented individuals.

"We expect the center to attract leaders of the academic and professional world. We happen to live in a beautiful region of the country and to have this convention center will provide a major boost to the tourism
