## State College Head Visits Campus

Last Thursday afternoon, April 23, Mr. J. W. Harrelson, Dean of the Administration at North Carolina State College, talked to those students who are interested in engineering work.

Dean Harrelson talked to the group gathered in the auditorium on technological work and suggested that we need more people to become cultured engineers. He pointed out the importance of engineering and agriculture in our every day lives and stated that we needed more good agriculture teachers in our present-day schools. He indicated the best fields in this work and made suggestions; but he stated that, whatever field we went into, we should do our best to become efficient in that work.

Among the most helpful things that Dean Harrelson did while here was to go over the engineering and agriculture curriculum at State. He stressed the most important points in these and offered suggestions along this line. He also discussed the qualifications on State for this type of work and told of the chances that one had of obtaining some self-help work to help defray the expenses.

After this discussion before the entire group Mr. Harrelson held individual conferences with those who wished to talk with him privately and obtain other information.

Glen Cannon Falls are located about four miles southwest in a creek, just beyond the French Broad River.

Hikes of this nature will very probably be conducted each Saturday or Sunday until the close of the quarter.
