The Barter Theatre of Virginia was the entertaining guests of the college last Tuesday night, Dec. 9. This theatre which is on national tour is celebrating its twentieth anniversary of bringing plays to various parts of the country.

They presented a three-act play by Sidney Howard, The Late Christopher Bean, which is set entirely in the dining room of the Haggetts' house not far from Boston. This play was first presented in New York, and has been adapted from a French play. The cast is made up of nine professional players.

The male star is Owen Phillips who served also as director, and who has been seen in many Warner Brothers pictures. He was head of the department of drama at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, the school from which Mr. B. A. Livengood graduated.

The female star, Dorothy La-Vern, is known as Miss Show Business and is a veteran trouper. From her own stock company emerged Melvyn Douglas and Ralph Bellamy. She has also worked with such alltime greats as Mary Pickford and Lionel Barrymore. Because of the requirements of her profession, she lists the U.S. A. as her home town.

Twenty boys responded to the early morning call of Coach Fitzpatrick to assist in fighting a very serious forest fire in the Tennessee Gap area of Pisgah National Forest on the seventh day of November. Coach Fitzpatrick called for volunteers after receiving an urgent call for help from the forestry service. This call came at 1:15 a. m. and by 1:30 those able to go were dressed and waiting for the bus that was to take them to the scene of the fire.

The fire was located some 35 miles from Brevard in the Tennessee Gap. The trip was made in a little over an hour, and by three that morning, the boys were ready to begin their task. The work to be done consisted mainly of scraping fire trenches around the fire and then to patrol the line in order to prevent further breakovers. The grueling work seemed to never end as fire after fire seemed to spring up out of nowhere behind the original blaze. One of the most tiresome jobs was carrying water from nearby springs.
