**"Oedipus Rex" Ends Year's Lyceum Series**

Oedipus Rex, a Greek drama, by Sophocles was presented as a Lyceum program March 9, 1959, at Brevard college in the Campus Center auditorium.

Players Incorporated presented a new adaptation of the play by Leo Hardy with clarity and simplicity, leaving a lasting impression on the audience.

The plot, disclosed at Thebes before the palace of Oedipus, revealed the fulfillment of a prophecy that Oedipus would kill his father and marry his mother. Upon finding this to be true, Oedipus blinded himself immediately after his mother - wife, Jocasta, hanged herself. Creon, the brother - in - law of Oedipus, banished him.

A unity of time, place, and action was observed as was the custom of the ancient Greek theatre. To keep the audience informed as to the happenings off stage, a chorus was assembled.

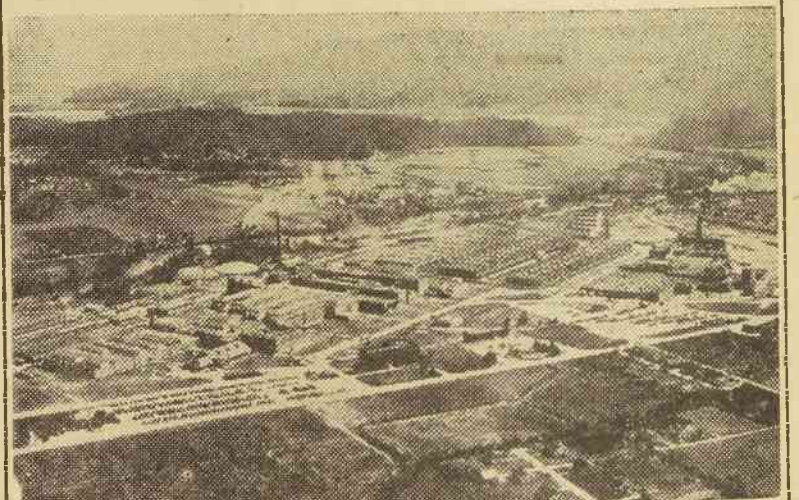
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
