Tornadoes Romp Over Gastonia 11-0

Brevard's Tornadoes broke a six-game losing streak last Saturday night as they opened up a fiery barrage of hits in clubbing three Gastonia Tech pitchers, picking up their second win of the season. Brevard took the lead in the top of the first inning and kept adding to it as the game progressed.

The Tornadoes combined the talents of top hurler, Harry Skipper, and ace reliever, Tommy Dickens, to hold the Tech men to a total of three softies. Skipper, pitching his second game in two nights, was a magician on the mound. He allowed only two hits in his six inning stint, while striking out eight batters. Skipper had full control of his sharp, breaking curve, fast ball, and change-up and was never in trouble. Tommy Dickens came on in the sixth and allowed one hit, a triple, in the eighth, while fanning four batters.

The Tornadoes played their best ballgame of the season here, not committing an error. They had been "edged" by Wingate the night before, mainly because of poor fielding. Their record for the season now stands at two wins against six defeats.
