# Hendersonville Favored In WNC Sectional Track Meet Here Friday

Hendersonville's defending champs rule as favorites of the third annual WNC Sectional Track Meet to be held here Friday.

Meet director, "Chick" Martin, athletic director of Brevard College, reveals that heats for running events and preliminary trials for field events will get under

way at 11 a.m. Friday. Coach Martin stated that schools in District 8 of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association regardless of classification are eligible to participate in the meet.

The meet will be run over the quarter-mile grasstex oval at Brevard Junior College with NCHSAA rules being observed. The first and second place teams in each relay event and first three finishers in each individual event qualify for the state track event qualified for the state.

Hendersonville was rated as team favorite for the WNC sectional on the basis of its undefeated record of seven wins including the News - Piedmont Relays, WHKP Relays, South-

ern Relays and Blue Ridge Conference. Expected to offer the strongest challenge is Enka with its strong relay teams and superb field event performers.

Lee Edwards, Brevard, Reyn-olds and West Henderson also boast strong teams.

Plans for the sectional were drawn up last week by a committee consisting of Martin as chairman, Walt Shuford of Lee Edwards, Cliff Brookshire of Brevard, Bill McElrath of Enka and Rob Brown of Hendersonville.

Early indications are that more than 15 teams and over 400 athletes will be entered in the meet. In view of performances thus far in other meets existing records aren't expected to withstand Friday's assault in at least eight events if good weather prevails.


