## Munro Heads Teachers' Organization

Mrs. Grace J. Munro, business professor at Brevard College, was elected president of Delta Kappa Gamma, an international teacher's organization designed to give recognition to outstanding educators, on February 12, 1966.

Mrs. Munro, who has taught at the college for 10 years, was born in Clio, South Carolina. She received her B.S. at Winthrop College, Rock Hill, S. C. and her M.S. at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Considerable and varied teaching experiences have given Mrs. Munro the necessary qualifications for her new job. She taught at Brevard College; Cool Springs High School, Forest City, N. C.; and at a dependent's school in Japan before returning here in 1955. She has also worked as secretary to a South Carolina senator and on a newspaper.

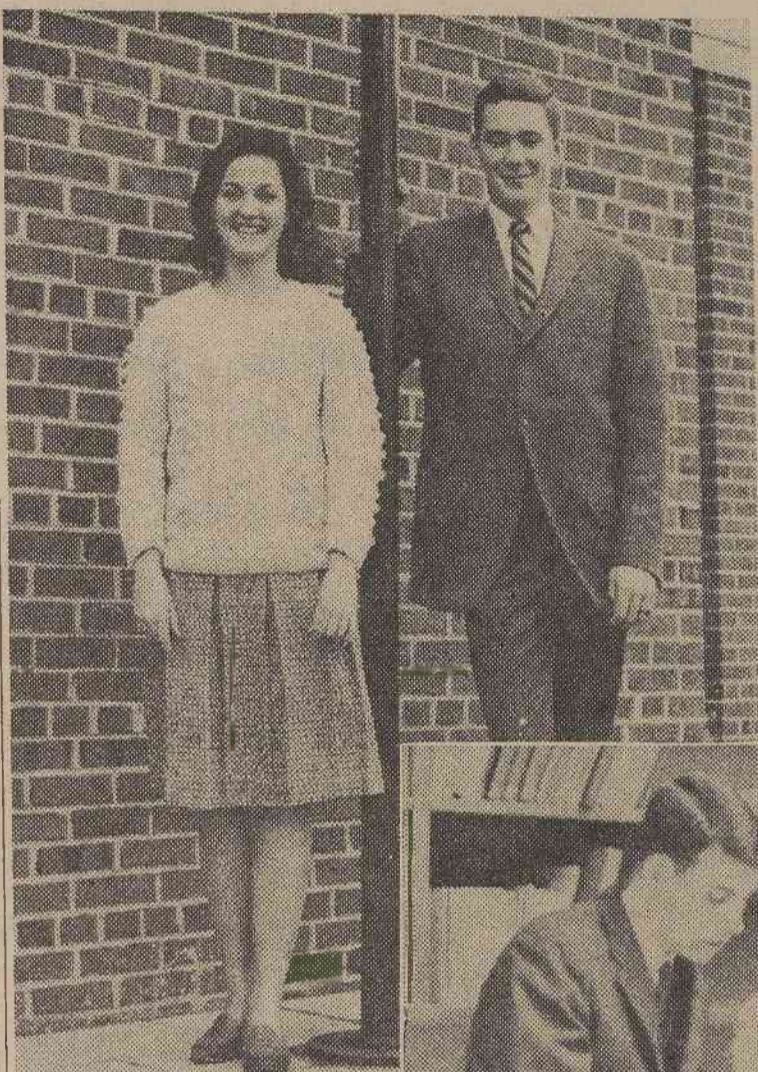
Mrs. Dana Harris, who conducts the class, invites consultants from a variety of fields to speak before the students to help them better understand and prepare for their marriage and family lives.
