building being dedicated to Mr. H. A. Dunham of Asheville. He had given the college over a quarter of a million dollars. On October 15, 1947, Dr. E. J. Coltrane unveiled a portrait of the benefactor which now hangs in the library.

A fire broke out in the building in October of 1950, which nearly destroyed the interior of the building. Dunham Hall was closed for a year with the library housing all the offices, parties, chapels, and even graduation. It was reopened the following fall, the interior completely renovated.

In 1965, the building changed its name again, the third time in 50 years. The Classroom Building, still the "knowledge building" of Brevard College, is used now for academic courses, other than science and math, and the day students lounge.

The Lena Sue Beam Dorm was finished during the summer of 1966 to become the newest building on campus. Because of the length of time needed to complete it, the school year started a month later than was planned.

Dedicated on October 13, the dorm has the capacity to room 180 students. The modern interior decoration enhances the looks of the dorm. The visitors, who received guided tours of the building during homecoming, compared the new dorm quite favorably with those in larger institutions. The girls, whose home it is, say they "love it."
