The theme for the conven-tion was "Unto the Least of These." Programs consisted of These." Programs consisted of worship services, discussion groups, business meetings, and four enlightening plays. The plays included were IN WHITE AMERICA, CHRIST IN THE CONCRETE CITY, ON PATTERSON AVENUE, and TO BE BACK. They were presented by two Apostalia drama teams, the LISTEN team, and a group of ten Negroes from Shaw University. Related to the theme was a 20 foot tall backdrop behind the pulpit containing the following statement: "I am a Christian. I will love the unlovely, the Slob, the Queer, I will minister to the Cop, the Whore, the Creep; I will pray for the Loser, the Mindless Masses, the Self-sufficient. For I am a Christian . . . I Love!"

The two main speeches were given by Rev. Bud Walker, Har-ward graduate, and Dr. Jack R. Noffsinger, pastor of Knoll-wood Baptist Church in Win-ston - Salem. The American Classical Theatre will perform Shakespeare's "The Comedy of Errors" as a part of the lyeum series of Brevard College. Two perfor-mances will be given; one on November 14 and one on November 15 at 8:15 p.m. in the auditorium of Dunham Fine Arts Center.

"The Comedy of Errors" is Shakespeare's earliest and perhaps funniest play. It has been performed throughout the world for nearly three hundred years and has appealed to all age groups. The play is equipped with robust action, appealing characters, and a skillful

Although the play is Elizabethan, Shakespeare adapted it from a Roman play by Plautus and combined with it several elements of other classic plays.
