With ten years of work and omething like a hundred milon wheelbarrow loads of earth nd stone, the cost will be $\$ 33$ 600,000 or $\$ 1,600,00$ a mile.
The new road is unique in that it will have a median barrier of concrete 30 to 36 inches high which will make head-on collisions nearly impossible. The barrier will stretch the entire distance except for occasional crossovers. Following the Pigeon River, fills, up to 320 feet high, had to be made, for there are no valleys that would
