

### Choirs to perform works of German theologian

One of the greatest Christian theologians of the 20th century was killed by hanging by the German Gestapo in 1945 - Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Through travels and study in the United States, Bonhoeffer was well-known before his arrest by Hitler's forces. After his arrest, he became even more widely known because of his writings from his prison cell. Since his death as a modern-day Christian martyr,

and the discovery of additional writings, his fame has continued to spread throughout all of Christendom.

On this coming Sunday morning at 11:00 a.m. the Brevard College Choir will join the Chancel Choir of the First United Methodist church to present a cantata based upon four short paragraphs by Bonhoeffer. The work was composed by Richard Peek, Organist and Choir Director of the Covenant Presbyterian church, Charlotte, and entitled, "Stations on the Road to Freedom," which is the title given to these ideas by Bonhoeffer himself. The "stations" are: discipline, action, suffering, death. The four "stations" parallel the life of Bonhoeffer and also of Christ Himself.

A second work will also be presented by the choir: "Three Lenten Poems" based on texts by the poet, Richard Crashaw. The music was composed by

Daniel Pinkham, a church musician in Boston. Tensions and dissonances are very much present in these works to reflect the agonies of the experiences described, but the ending is triumphant. Part of the unusual effect of this music will be through the accompaniment for the works. The Pinkham work will be accompanied by two violins, clarinet, cello, and vibraphone. The Peek cantata will be accompanied by piano, tympani, gong, and organ.

These two works are presented in observance of Passion Sunday and will be directed by the Reverend Nelson F. Adams. The Reverend Orion N. Hutchinson, Jr., Minister of the First United Methodist church will deliver a Meditation on "The Mount of Betrayal" as a continuation of a sermon series on "With Christ in Mountaintop Experience." The service will be broadcast on Radio Station WPNF.

### BC elections approaching

As presidential candidates and others across the nation prepare for the upcoming elections, Brevard College campus is also involved in its preparations for the student government elections.

The spring elections will be held on Wednesday, March 22. On Monday, March 20, there will be an assembly where all those running for an office will be introduced to the student body. The offices to be filled are the following: President of the Student Union, President of the Social Board, Speaker of the Legislature, Sophomore Judicial Board Members, Sophomore class officers, Sophomore class representatives, Day Student President and dorm and day student representatives to the Social Board.

However, certain qualifications must be met in order to be elected to these posts. With the exception of the Sophomore judicial board members, and the dorm and day representatives, all candidates must have and maintain a 2.0 average through their term of office. The exceptions to this rule are required to maintain a 1.75 average.

All candidates for any office must be free of Disciplinary Probation at the time of their election and throughout their term of office.

### Brevard begins first fund raising drive

For the first time in four years Brevard has kicked off a fund raising drive for the betterment of its facilities. The 1972 campaign will include the surrounding Tri-County Area, consisting of Transylvania, Henderson, and Buncombe, and it is hoped that \$30,000 will be raised between now and May 31, 1972.

In a general sense the purpose of this drive is to do the following:

- 1) Help Brevard College meet its operating expenses.
- 2) Undergird and expand funds for student aid.
- 3) Help make campus improvements.
- 4) Underwrite and expand funds for library.

In addition to these above priorities, funds are also need-

ed to assist in the renovation of the music building and its equipment. Also needed is aid toward meeting the library endowment of \$50,000.

Specific gifts can provide for the college in this manner:

- \$10,000 The equivalent to a year's return upon added endowment of \$200,000.
- \$ 5,000 Science laboratory equipment.
- \$ 1,000 A year's tuition for a student.
- \$ 500 Scholarship fund addition equivalent to a semester of tuition.
- \$ 100 10 books for the library.
