Dr. James G. Traynham Featured At Convocation

Dr. James G. Traynham, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Chemistry at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, was the featured speaker at Brevard College's Convocation, Wenesay, February, 7, at 10 a. m. His visit was made possible by the Visiting Scientist Program of the American Chemical Society. Dr. Traynham also spoke to the Organic and General Chemistry classes on Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

A native of Georgia Dr. Traynham is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and received the B. S. degree in Chemistry from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the Ph.D. degree from Northwestern University. Prior to joining

the LSU faculty, Dr. Traynham taught at Denison University in Granville, Ohio and did research at Ohio State University. In 1953 he became a faculty member at LSU and was appointed Chairman of the Department in 1968. Dr. Traynham regularly teaches undergraduate organic chemistry courses and publishes research papers in distinguished chemical journals. Seventeen students have received the Ph.D. degree; ten, the M.S. degree under his direction.

In addition to teaching and research, Dr. Traynham has written a supplemental, programmed text on organic chemical nomenclature for undergraduate students. He is a Coun-

cilor of the Baton Rouge Section of the American Chemical Society, and a member of the American Chemical Society Council Committee on Chemical Education. He has spent two sabbatical leaves of study and research in Europe; the most recent one as a NATO Sen-

ior Fellow in Science at Universitat des Saarlandes, Saarbrücken, Germany.

Dr. Traynham is married and has two sons who are students at LSU - BR. He is an active member of University United Methodist Church in Baton Rouge.

N. C. State Dept. Of Natural Resources Offers Program

The State Department of Natural and Economic Resources has announced it is accepting applications for its summer intern program for college students.

Twenty-one internships at \$360 per month for three months are being offered by the Department.

Students will be asked to prepare reports on subjects ranging from development of interstate short tours to the effluent charge alternative as a means of water quality control.

Other subjects are local planning; analysis of industrial market; public participation in state water plan preparation; water inventory of wet industries; recreation consultant; and field research on the experimental method of evaluating aquatic food plants in salt marsh impoundments.

Applicants need to have completed two years of college or technical training prior to beginning internship.

Lathrop Discusses Travel-Study To Holy Lands This Summer

Students interested in Palestinian archaeology and historical geography of the Holy Land could earn up to six hours of academic credit from Tel Aviv University this summer. According to Assistant Professor Keith Lathrop, math teacher at Brevard College, students and other interested individuals are welcome to become involved in a travel - study program on the Greek mainland, the Greek Islands, and Israel for three weeks and continuing excavations at a major archaeological site in Israel for three weeks.

Excavations at Tel Aphek near the Yarkon River on the outskirts of Tel Aviv will be directed by Dr. George L. Kelm, Director of the Institute of Archaeological Research, and Dr. Moshe Kochavi, Assistant Professor of Archaeology at Tel Aviv University.

Mr. Lathrop, who participated in the Institute of Archaeological Research's program last summer with Mrs. Lathrop, encourages those who might be able to participate to contact him for details of itinerary and cost.
