

## Sophia Stars In "The Priest's Wife," March 2

Film marriages aren't made in Hollywood or in heaven. They're made by box-office receipts, by a public enthralled with two stars and clamoring to see them "together again." The film marriage of Sophia Loren and Marcello Mastroianni is possibly the prime example. They've made seven pictures together, all great box-office successes.

## Tornadoes Finish Regular Season

The Brevard Tornadoes finished their regular basketball season February 19 in Boshamer Gymnasium. Brevard finished 12-14 overall and 6-8 in the WCJCC, placing fourth.

Brevard traveled to Banner Elk, N. C. only to be defeated 89-81. Led by four double figure scorers with Rick McClure high of 29 points, the roundballers could not seem to get the breaks needed to win the close games. Brevard was able to take the lead for a short time early in the second half after being down 41-38 at intermission. But the Bobcats fought back into the lead and held it until the last buzzer.

Spartanburg Junior College came to Boshamer Gym Feb. 10 and found themselves on the short end of a low scoring ball game 69-62. Again Rick McClure and Mike Coles led the Tornadoes in points, getting 25 and 20 respectively.

Nationally ranked Anderson Junior College invaded Brevard Feb. 12. George Hester seemed to be the only Tornado that could score in the game. He was game high with 26 points. The shooting percent-

tage was very low and helped Anderson to be a 82-80 last second victory. With 7 seconds showing on the clock Anderson brought the inbounds of Brevard's end of the floor. A quick pass to Jo-Jo Bethea in the lane resulted in his scoring as the final buzzer sounded.

Down by 13 points 47-34 at half time, the Brevard defense stifled the Anderson offense until their shooting hands warmed up. The Tornadoes were able to tie the game at 80 in the last minute of play, but the odds seem to be against Brevard winning any close games. At Wingate the Tornadoes lost their third overtime game of the season, 91-85. All five of Brevard's starters scored in double figures. Mike Coles 21, Bob Miller 19, McClure 16, Hester and Rock Perry 10 each. Foul trouble hurt the Tornadoes as four played fouled out. Frank Blount went out in regulation time and Hester, Coles, and Perry were all victims of the overtime.

In a non conference game with Hiwassee, Brevard found itself victims of a second half

let down. After leading 52-40 at half time the Tornadoes seemed to die after returning to the floor. Mike Coles was high man in the game with 32 points and 16 rebounds.

Playing their last regular season game here, the Tornadoes had a disappointing loss to N. Greenville, 89-77. Again bad shooting by the home team was the difference in the game. N. Greenville jumped to an early lead and held it the entire game; Brevard was never within 10 points. Everyone on the team saw action in the game and all but two players scored. Mike Coles was the leader with 22 points and 13 rebounds.

Brevard will see action again Thursday night, Feb. 22 in the first round of the Western Carolinas Junior College Conference Tournament at Wofford College in Spartanburg, South Carolina. Brevard will be trying to defend its title of a year ago.

The schools represented will be Anderson, Brevard, Lees McRae, Mitchell, Montreat Anderson, N. Greenville, Spartanburg, and Wingate. It is expected that Brevard will face either Wingate or Mitchell in the first round.

The support of the school is wanted by the team and needed for Brevard to have a good tournament. Give your support as Brevard goes for the title two years in a row.

## Roadrunners Improving

The "Roadrunners" of Brevard are improving. In the month of February the team has had two indoor meets. On Feb. 9, the team traveled to Montgomery, Alabama. Even though no one placed in this meet, Coach Wittek stated that they had fairly respectable jumps and times. According to Coach Wittek, the standouts for Brevard in this meet were Mike Bailey, Sam Beasley, John Clark, and Grady Decell. Bailey ran the 2 mile for a time of 9:38.1. The Roadrunners then went back to Knoxville, Tennessee on Feb. 16 to try and gain revenge from their first meeting there on Jan. 26. Coach Wittek stated that there was no real spectacular performance shown but that the team did improve. He stated that the team seemed more relaxed and mature and knew what to

expect this time. Brevard did have a couple of finishers in this meet. John Clark took 6th place in the long jump with a jump of 21.1. Clay White also placed in the triple jump with a jump of 45 feet and 8/4 inches. Mike Anderson won his heat in the 440 with a time of 54.4. Grady Decell won the 100 yard dash with a time of 117.9. Also for Brevard Wayne Foster ran a 4:38.5 mile. Brevard's last indoor meet will be March 2 at Knoxville, Tennessee. The meet will start at 5:30 and there will be no admission. These indoor meets the Roadrunners are running are mainly for experience and will benefit them when the regular season starts. The captains for the team will be announced in the next issue.
