

Brevard College Fine Arts Division To Present "Oliver"

On April 12th, 13th, and 14th, the Brevard College Division of Fine Arts will present the musical **OLIVER**.

OLIVER is a musical adaptation by Lionel Bart of Charles Dickens' novel, *Oliver Twist*. The musical takes the audience to early 19th century London where we first see a typical establishment of that day, the workhouse, where orphaned and abandoned children are kept.

When Oliver has the effrontery to ask for more food, Mr. Bumble, keeper of the workhouse, sells him to Mr. Sowerberry, the undertaker. Oliver runs away from Mr. Sowerberry, and is subsequently taken in by Old Fagin who takes in run-away boys and teaches them to become pick pockets.

The musical carries us through the adventures of Oliver and others connected with Fagin's "pick-pocket school"—Nancy, the Artful Dodger, Bet and Bill Sikes.

The musical score takes us to Bloomsbury Plaza where street vendors, house-maids and other Londoners express in song and dance the joys of a beautiful London morning in the song "Who Will Buy". "Oom-Pah-Pah" takes us to the Three Cripples Inn, a London pub, where we see another segment of society enjoying an evening of revelry.

Other musical selections include Nancy's beautiful "As Long As He Needs Me." Oliver's haunting "Where is Love?", Fagin's "Reviewing The Situation", and the exuberant "Consider Yourself At Home", sung by Oliver, Dodger and the people of London.

The title role of Oliver will be played by Leon Lee, Jr.

Leon Lee, Sr., of the Brevard College faculty will be seen in the role of Mr. Sowerberry. A third member of the Lee Family, Susan, will be seen in the role of the orphaned Bet.

Fagin will be portrayed by Garrett Hogan, Brevard College freshman from Charlotte. The Artful Dodger will be portrayed by Charles Jennette, a freshman from Goldsboro. Marion Whatley of Brevard will portray the role of Nancy. Steve Maddox, Goldsboro, will be seen as the villainous Bill Sikes. Lynn Tuttle from Madison will be seen as the Widow Corney, assistant in the workhouse. Kathy Gelbach, sophomore from Charlotte, will be seen as Mrs. Sowerberry.

Other Brevard College faculty members in the show are Harvey Miller as Mr. Bumble, and Eric Wiechert as Mr. Brownlow, a wealthy Londoner who turns out to be Oliver's grandfather.

Students from Brevard College and Brevard High School will comprise the chorus which represents many levels of London society. Twenty-two Brevard children from the ages of 7 to 13 will be seen in the show as the workhouse boys and as Fagin's pick-pockets.

Claire Cope who designed and made the elegant medieval costumes for *Camelot*, and the colorful hillbilly outfits for *Li'l Abner*, has turned to a different period of time, and has created cut away coats and elegant gowns for the show. The show is directed by Sam Cope.

Performances will be in Dunham Auditorium at 8:00 p. m., April 12th, 13th, and 14th. Student tickets are 75c. Reservations may be obtained through the Music Department.

Phi Theta Kappa Taps Members

At a Convocation held in Dunham Auditorium on March 28th, 18 students of Brevard College were tapped for membership in the national Phi Theta Kappa fraternity. Candidates tapped for membership for Phi Theta Kappa must be of good moral character and possess recognized qualities of citizenship as judged by the faculty. They must also maintain an accumulative average of 3.2 through three marking periods.

In order to have a chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, a college is required to offer two years of collegiate work equivalent to the freshman and sophomore years of a standard four year college. The College must be accredited by a state or regional accrediting agent, or fulfill requirements of the Phi Theta Kappa Executive Council, and be a member of the American Association of Junior Colleges.
