

Brevard College is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the North Carolina Department of Education, the University Senate of the United Methodist Church and the National Association of Music Schools.

The Southern Association believes that a university or college must grow and improve in quality or it declines. The Southern Association encourages growth and improvement in quality through their Institutional Self-Study Program. Once in every 10-years period each member college or university conducts a comprehensive study of its purpose in relation to its organization and administration, educational program, financial resources, faculty, library, student person-nel, physical plant, and special activities.


