Homecoming Begins Tonight With Open Dorms And Movie



He succeeds Allen Sims, of Gastonia, who announced his retirement from the post after 12 years. Mr. Sims was named Chairman Emeritus.

Dr. Nicholson has been minister of Providence United Methodist Church in Charlotte since 1970. Prior to his going to Charlotte, he was minister at Central United Methodist Church in Ashe-

Dr. Nicholson received his education at Mitchell Junior College, Lenoir-Rhyne College where he received his A. B. de-

gree; the B.D. Degree at Duke Divinity School; he attended Duke Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, and in 1964 recevied the Doctor of Divinity degree frim Pfeiffer College.

He is married to the former Hazel Montgomery and they have three children: Garren Herman, Erick Monty and Melanie Vercille.

Dr. Nicholson is Delegate, Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference; Delegate, General Confeence; Trustee of Brevard Collefe, Trustee of Pfeiffer College; Chairman, Board of Education, W.N.C. Conference.

He was formerly a member, Conference Commission of World Service and Finance; Conference Historian; President, Conference Historical Society; Chairman, Citizens Committee for Better Schools for Haywood County.
