Perhaps the most visible effort of the outing club is their involvement with the Banff Mountain Film Festival World Tour. Each spring the Outing Club sponsors and facilitates this event, which typically packs the Porter Center for each of the two nights the tour is in town.

The tour, often referred to simply as "Banff," is a showcase of the best films entered in the Banff Mountain Film Festival held each year in Banff, Canada. The World Tour travels across the world showing films on outdoor sports such as kayaking, climbing, mountain biking and many others, as well as films on mountain cultures, nature, and environmental concerns.

The outing club works closely with the cycling team to plan, organize, and run the event that never fails to be a crowd pleaser and fundraiser for the club.

This year the club also took part in the Adventure Education Conference held last weekend in the Porter Center. The club sponsored the "Croc o' Gold" competition, a tradition started last year by the outing club at Western Carolina University, who hosted the conference that year.
