



B. and M. A. degrees from Duke University, graduate study at the University of Virginia, law study at the University of North Carolina, and activity in the Farmville Methodist Church and many civic projects. He holds membership in the following Greek letter fraternities: Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Delta Kappa, Tau Kappa Alpha, and Pi Kappa Delta. Also, Mr. Holton represents a North Carolina family well known in the educational and reli-

He asserted that in entering upon his new duties he would adopt a policy not of sudden change but of
