When the doors were about to be closed in 1896 because of financial difficulties, she and her father, Matthew S. Davis, were asked to operate the institution. Washington Duke, owner of the College property, leased the Main Building to evening Mr. Davis and his daughter for \$300 per year.

Mary Davis was appointed business manager and, to the surprise of many including Mr. Duke, the College began to thrive. Miss Davis became Mrs. Ivey Allen in 1900. Mr. Allen was secretary and treasurer for a number of years, and the two brought up their family almost on the college doorsteps.
