E.B.: "Dazed and Confused". Now that Easter's here, "The Party's Over" for me and I'll take that "Morning Train" every day to work from "9 to 5".



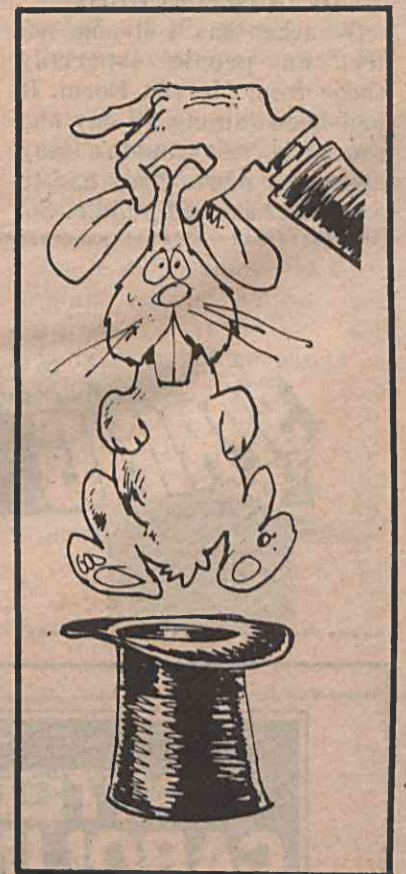
COLUMNS: Is there anything that would keep you from delivering your eggs?
