## Two New Faculty Members at Louisburg College for Spring Semester

Two new faculty members can be seen this semester in Louisburg College classrooms.

Tim Allen and Elisa Wolper have each taken up teaching duties for Spring 1996. Allen teaches two classes on the New Testament and an independent student, and Wolper teaches an introductory class on economics in Louisburg's Weekend College.

Allen is minister of Liberty Vance Church in Vance County and also teaches part-time with Vance-Granville Community College. He holds master's degrees from U.N.C.- Chapel Hill and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. His teaching at Louisburg, he said, has been a fulfilling one.

"The students, overall, seem to

want to learn, and I'm enjoying that."

He added that he finds it particularly useful to play the role of "Devil's advocate."

"It's my job to ask the tough questions," he said.

A Raleigh resident who grew up in Massachusetts, Wolper received her bachelor's degree from Harvard University and is now completing her doctorate in economics at N.C. State University, where she is also earned her master's degree.

Wolper first learned of Louisburg's Weekend College through the economics department at N.C. State. Designed for working adults who are unable to return to school in a traditional setting, the Weekend College offers Sat-
