said. But he has recently become interested in the problems Blacks on campus have been going through.

But, African students do not feel at liberty to vocally support Black Americans, Bonney said, because they think they could be deported. Bonney, a short, stocky, dark man with a huge smile, is president of African Fellows Resident in Chapel Hill Area, which is an organization on campus. The group had 25 members last semester, but 10 South Africans left and were not replaced Bonney said.


It has been said that Africans don't identify with Black Americans, even though they have the same ancestral background. Bonney said that the rumor about the rift between they two peoples may be true
