handle by themselves. He added that college recruiters are seldom able to persuade high school seniors to choose North Carolina State A&T University over North Carolina State University.

Rushing said the inequalities between the traditionally black and white colleges would make the plan "successful in principle, but not in practice."

UNC system officials conveyed satisfaction with the decree. William C. Friday, President of the UNC system told the board

at it's last summer meeting in July he had began to implement the decree. "The program set forth in that document is going to be the program we will follow for the next five years."

John R. An, chairman of the board said not everych would be satisfied with the decree. "The academic community throughout the country is breathing a sigh of relief because UNC took its stand on who will entrol the internal affairs of the University."


