

GARDNER-WEBB STOPPED COLD BY L-R JV'S

Lenoir-Rhyne Jayves took advantage of Gardner-Webb's tardiness and passes and trounced the Bulldogs by a score of 26-0 on a muddy home field. While they were not cashing in on G-W's plays and misplays, the Black Bears were doing some fancy passing and running to score once in the first, second, third, and fourth quarters.

FIRST QUARTER
The Jayves' first score came midway in the first quarter, when Jones, Lenoir-Rhyne tackle, blocked Black's punt and returned it to the 20. Moments later Frye passed to Cull for the score. The try for the extra point was no good.

The slow, rain-soaked field halted the ground gaining forces of both teams, forcing them to stay in the air most of the game. The Bulldogs attempted 20 forward passes and completed 4 for a total of 87 yards. The Junior Bear attempted 13 and completed 9 for a gain of 74 yards.

Late in the second quarter Weinstein, Jayve end, intercepted Smith's pass and raced 42 yards for the second touchdown. The conversion was good and Lenoir-Rhyne led 14-0. Sherill took Cerdell's kickoff on the 10 and was brought down on the 20. On the next play Sherill, regular G-W end, dropped back to complete a pass to Williamson for 38 yards. With the ball resting on Lenoir-Rhyne's 40 the half ended to 40-0 G-W's threat.

Because of the spectacular punting of Bolick and Black, G-W fullbacks, the Bulldogs kept Lenoir-Rhyne in their own territory most of the game. Together these stellar backs averaged 43 yards per punt.

Lenoir-Rhyne's third score came midway in the third period. After an incomplete passing play, the Jayves penally Black kicked to the 35, from where Hickox punted to Hill for 20 yards and Frye passed to Cull for the score. The conversion was no good. Gardner-Webb's pass receivers were guarded closely all afternoon breaking in the clear on only six occasions.

After a series of short passes Frye hit Cull in the end zone for the last Lenoir-Rhyne score. Frye also passed to Cull for the extra point.

Smith, Bolick, Black, and Freeman stood out in the Gardner-Webb backfield, while Jones, Humphrey and Kiser played well on the line. Jones, Snyder, and Buffone played well for the Jayves, while Frye, Cull, and Tuttle sparked the backfield.

The name of Miss Etta L. Curtis is another which is entwined with the earliest days of Gardner-Webb. For 27 years she was connected in an official capacity with the high school and the college. As Dean of women she touched many, both directly and indirectly. Born in Wilkes county, the daughter of Dr. Henry Curtis, she came of a family of pioneers who were keenly interested in promoting education on the new continent. Her grandfather, Dr. William Curtis founded and became the first president of Limestone College, and it was only natural that, with this background, the daughter of such forebears should care herself to the cause of education. She began teaching at 10 and continued in that work until, almost the end of her long life, her experience in Texas, Georgia, and New York, N. C., and at Piedmont High School she came to Hough Springs High School in 1909.

Her participation in teaching was only one of her qualifications for the position she held. Her honesty, loyalty and her untiring efforts were surpassed only by her joy and her faith that the student would live. Matched even by her emotions, in the earlier days of the school struggle, she would often drive all through the mountains in association in a policy to select students and fund-raising.
