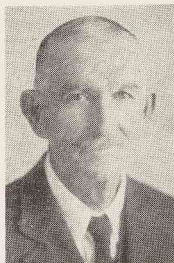

## Mrs. Grady Lovelace of Shelby Writes:

Mr. J. H. Quinn, Lawyer, Educator and Baptist Layman played a prominent part in the founding of Boiling Springs High School, and served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees from 1906 until 1929, when Trustees were elected to serve a definite term. Mr. Quinn was made Chairman Ex Officio in which capacity he served until his health failed in 1936.

Mr. Quinn gave liberally of his means, always attended the Associational meetings to represent the School; he made hundreds of speeches and devoted many days of conscientious effort and unflinching Prayer, that the School would be able to withstand financial difficulties, and would continue to be a blessing to the youth of this section.

For many years it was his custom to entertain all the faculty members in his home and give them assurance of his faith in them; he was always ready to share their difficulties and sympathize with them. He was frequently called upon for advice which was given freely, but carefully.
