### G-W Students Eligible For UNC Scholarship

At a recent date, John Morehead, a native North Carolinian, announced the establishment of a scholarship fund of more than two million dollars at the University of North Carolina. Mr. Morehead had previously contributed generously to the planetarium there. Interested in the development of well rounded citizens, he is establishing this fund for the education of boys who have outstanding moral and intellectual characteristics. There is no limitation as to the course of studies that the candidates must pursue.

At the present time, there are no scholarships being awarded to high school graduates, but to graduates of junior and senior colleges in North Carolina. Each approved institution is to appoint a committee to nominate candidates for consideration for these awards.

Gardner-Webb has the privilege of nominating as many as five candidates. These persons will later be invited to Chapel Hill for additional testing, and a central committee of the foundation will make the awards which amount to approximately \$1500 each.
