For almost a decade Gardner-Webb College has had far-reaching influence as a school with a high scholastic rating, superior executive leadership, and an outstanding faculty. In the last few years its rise as a potent athletic power has been remarkable.

Our students also manage to achieve outstanding records after leaving Gardner-Webb. The percentage of our graduates who attend senior college is tremendously high. Living in an age when the development of youth has been greatly stressed, our school has become a leader in preparation for the future.

However, student activity and participation has not been at its best during this school year. We have not as yet lived up to the goal set for complete student government.

Less than half of the members of the sophomore class attended a recent class meeting. The average attendance in freshman meetings is only about 50% of the enrollment. Participation in other activities is similar!

We must put our all to work in the coming elections. The responsibility imposed upon us as students may be met by discussing the candidates, endorsing someone for each job, and trying our best to get our candidates elected. Let this year end as we hope the next one will begin.

The climax of the annual struggle between the highly esteemed sophomores and the lowly freshmen for the official athletic supremacy of the campus has been set for April 10, but the contest between the two classes will begin at once. Competition in the team sports — football, basketball, baseball, volleyball, badminton, and ping pong — must be completed by the time for the track and field events so that a class winner can be picked according to the total points accumulated in all events.

The first contest between the two classes, a basketball game, is scheduled for March 13 at 8 o'clock in the high school gym. There will be both girls' and boys' games. The small admittance fee will be used in the preparation of the freshman-sophomore banquet which will climax the festivities of Field Day. Coach Ken Brady reports his team is in great shape and anticipating a great victory. Coach Bunny Price of the freshman squad is equally optimistic.

Try outs will be held for all sports and the times and the people in charge will be announced in the meetings of the respective classes.

Points will be given on this basis: five points for first, three points for second, and one point for third. Each participant in a team sport will receive one point and the winning team will receive five points. After all the events have been run off the freshman boy and girl and the sophomore boy and girl with the highest number of points will receive trophies as "Most Outstanding."

With competition in team sports from now until the big day, then the track and field events in the morning and a varsity baseball game in the afternoon of Field Day, and the Freshman-Sophomore Banquet to complete the affair in fine fashion, it really looks like a gala day for all.

And may we remind you that there will be no classes at any time during the busy day!!!
