The Delta Psi Omega dramatics fraternity of Gardner-Webb College made its semi-annual bid for honors in the field of entertainment by presenting two performances of Charlotte Brontë's "Jane Eyre" in the E. B. Hamrick Auditorium December 15-16 at 8:00 p.m.

Five hundred twenty-five high school seniors from Cleveland and adjoining counties were guests of the college for the performance on December 16.

The play, under the direction of Mr. J. Y. Hamrick, featured Betty Bates, a sophomore from Lincolnton, N. C., in the lead role as Jane, and Peter Banus, a sophomore from Duncelen, N. J., as Rochester.

Supporting roles were: Charles Starnes, freshman, Fayetteville, as Mason; Betty Jean Emmett, sophomore, Gastonia, as Mrs. Fairfax; Betty Stator, freshman, Charlotte, as Lady Ingram; Ann Banning, sophomore, Asheville, as Blanche; Phyllis Smith, freshman, Winston-Salem, as Grace; Bill Kimberlin, sophomore, Lenoir, as Mr. Wood.

The performance on the 16th was followed by an informal party in the school cafeteria where the visiting seniors and members of the cast were served refreshments.

MISS NANCY EAGLE GAVE
LYCEUM PROGRAM

Miss Nancy Eagle, pianist, musicologist, and member of the music faculty at Queens College, Charlotte, N. C., gave a piano concert on the Gardner-Webb College Lyceum program, Friday, February 5, at 10:30 a.m., in the E. B. Hamrick Auditorium of Gardner-Webb College.

Miss Eagle is a graduate of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina and holds the master's degree in musicology from the University of North Carolina. For the past several years she has served as faculty member in the Department of Fine Arts of Queens College. Miss Eagle has appeared in concert and radio performances at various places in North Carolina.

Miss Eagle played Sonata in E-flat Major by Haydn; three compositions from Brahms' Opus 116; Intermezzo No. 6, Capriccio, No. 7, and Intermezzo No. 4; and the Chopin Scherzo in B-flat Minor.

The Sonata in E-flat Major is a typical example of the classical sonata form and style of which Haydn is considered an early master. The first movement is in the standard sonata-allegro form and, with typical Haydn freshness and charm of style, reiterates at various places in the movement is slow and ornamental and lyrical. The third movement is based on the rondo idea of repetition and return to a main theme and is in a fast minuet tempo. The compositions from Brahms' Opus 116 reflect the philosophical nature of his mature piano music. The popular Chopin Scherzo in B-flat retains much of the idea of surprise originally contained in the scherzo had greatly increased in tempo and had lost much of its original style and form.
