The Joyful Noise has long been "booked up" for the semester. These engagements will take the group to Mississippi College, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and Birmingham, Alabama, as well as to local churches and civic clubs.

On January 15, the singers traveled to Greenville, S. C., for an eight hour recording ses-

sion at Mark V studios to produce a long-playing stereo album which is expected to arrive the first week of March. The Album will be a collection of contemporary songs as well as religious folk music with original compositions in both fields. These records will be sold at four dollars per album.
