## Opportunity

Coods at Gardner-Webb College will be given an unusual opportunity for a brighter future during the week of September 22-26.

Through a pilot Rubella Screening test sponsored by the Royster Memorial Hospital, young ladies who are interested can find out whether or not they have ever had Rubella (German Measles).

German Measles is a mild viral disease but it has been proven that, if contracted by a woman while she is pregnant, the disease can cause eye defects, mental retardation, congenital heart diseases, deafness

and other complications to the unborn infant.

There will be no cost. The program will be explained fully the week before testing. Only the immunity status is tested. Vaccination will be left up to the individual student to work out with his physician.

Each girl would give 5cc (one teaspoon) of blood. The laboratory will check the titer of each blood sample and the results will be sent back to each student.

This is the only program of its type in North Carolina and certainly an opportunity for Gardner-Webb students.



## Classics IV

On September the twelfth six members of the Student Union attended a concert by the Classics IV at Appalachian State University. The Classics IV will be performing at G. W. on the 18th of September. The sole purpose of the six members attending the early performance is for screening. Mr. Tom Poston said, "The committee has a certain position to occupy, and we want entertainment to be in line with the

## Vaughn And Hooper Leaving

Alex H. Vaughn, director of promotion at Gardner-Webb College for the past five years, has resigned that position and will begin work with the Liberty Corporation of Greenville, S. C.

He will be in the communications department of the Liberty Corporation and will be in charge of news, features and press relations. Liberty Corporation is a holding company with the Liberty Life Insurance Co. as its largest single holding.

During the five years he was with Gardner-Webb, Vaughn was in charge of the news bureau, sports information, photography, publications, and advisor to the student publications.

Commenting for THE PILOT, Vaughn said, "This has been a difficult decision for me because of the friendships devel-

oped with so many here at Gardner-Webb. It has been a privilege to be a part of the growth of Gardner-Webb.

"I do hope students will always keep in mind that any institution is always in certain stages of growth and come to appreciate just how great have been the strides of their college during the past seven or eight years.

"Certainly I wish the best for the students and the college as it moves into one of its most difficult and challenging periods."

Coach R. M. Hooper, the assistant basketball coach at Gardner-Webb College, has announced his resignation to enter into direct sales in Kingsport, Tenn.

Ron Hooper was with G. W. for one season coming to the college from Elkin High School where he was head coach

for three years. As assistant coach to head Coach Eddie Holbrook, the Gardner-Webb Bulldog team had the record of 31-5 and ended the season by being ranked 10th in the nation of Junior Colleges.

He has a B. S. degree in Business Administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and is doing graduate study at Appalachian State University.

Coach Hooper's resignation will be effective as soon as he can be replaced on the staff.

Coach Eddie Holbrook stated, "We hate to lose Coach Hooper. He fit well into the program and made a fine contribution to the basketball program both on and off the court. This certainly puts us behind in our development of a senior college program."
