Annex Now Named For Spangler

A well-known North Carolina businessman, R. Patrick Spangler, of Shelby, was honored by Gardner-Webb College when the college's Board of Trustees named a \$400,000 men's dormitory in his honor.

Spangler has served the college as Chairman of its Board of Trustees, has twice led the college in capital fund drives, and was recently elected Vice-

Chairman of the Board of Trustees and Chairman of the Board's Executive Committee.

The three story brick dormitory was built four years ago, but had not been named. It houses 96 men in its 48 rooms. It is all air-conditioned and fully carpeted.

Spangler is a native of Shelby and is president of Spangler's Ready Mix Concrete Company, of Shelby and Kings Mountain and also president of Shelby Sand and Stone Company. He serves as treasurer of Spangler and Sons Inc., of Shelby.

In 1965 he served as general chairman of the college's capital gifts campaign when \$2,525,000 was raised. He is now serving as national chairman of a campaign which has a goal of \$ 1,500,000. More than \$1,200,000 of this amount has already been given and the campaign has several more areas to work.

Junior-Senior Prom Survey: Positive Reply

During a recent Junior class meeting questionnaires were distributed which listed five questions concerning a Junior-Senior Prom. The following tabulation of the questionnaires

is presented by the Pilot for student consideration at the request of the Junior class officers.

The first question received the largest response from a total of 154 students. The Juniors were asked if they would like to have a Junior-Senior Prom and 124 students "yes" and 75 "no".

The question which received the least response asked specifically which committee each student would be willing to serve on. Thirty-two students wanted to work on the program committee, ten on the finance committee, nine on the food committee, and 30 on the decorating committee.

When asked if they would be willing to work on a project to help raise money, 145 students replied, 79 saying "yes" and 66 "no".

The question with a definite majority was the last question which asked the students if they were opposed to having any types of Junior-Senior whether it be a prom, banquet, or a picnic. Ten students replied "yes" and 131 "no".

A spokesman for the Junior-Class officers indicated that the success of a prom will depend on student support and interest.

Trustees And Advisors Meet Install Members

The Board of Trustees of Gardner-Webb College re-elected its chairman and installed eleven new members at its annual installation meeting. Lloyd C. Bost, Shelby bakery executive, was re-elected chairman.

The school's Board of Advisors also re-elected chairman, John R. Fraley, Cherryville trucking company president, and installed thirty new members.

Bost is vice president and secretary of Bost Bakery, Inc. Fraley is president of Carolina Freight Carriers Corporation. Other officers elected include: Board of Trustees-- R. Patrick Spangler, Shelby, vice chairman and chairman of the executive committee; Mrs. Ruth Stroup, Shelby, secretary; Miss Charline Slemey, Raiford, assistant secretary; Ralph Gardner, Shelby, treasurer and Dr. G.H. Harrell, Lincoln, assistant treasurer.

Eight new people were added to the board following action of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina which increased the size of the board from 28 to 36 members.
