

Renovation Ahead For Women's Affairs Board

Attention Gardner-Webb women!

Have you heard of the numerous changes that are occurring in connection with the Women's Affairs Board?

The main renovation has occurred within the power structure itself. WAB is in the process of changing its name to The Association of Women Students. This new association will enable all women of Gardner-Webb to have a voice in its affairs. Only those rules pertaining strictly to women residents can be voted on and passed by the A.W.S. These rules that include men students must be passed by the Senate. The Student Government Association now enforces a check—no balance system.

Heading the Association of Women Students will be the previous WAB officers, Brenda Jones, President; Gloria Holt, vice-president; and Debbie Walker, secretary. Other members include Carolyn Powers, President of Nurses; Gail Turner, President of Stripes; and Vicki Barrett, President of Haps. Miss Ruth Kiser serves as advisor.

As a result of the new name, the A.W.S. is in the process of re-writing their Constitution. Hopes are that the entire renovation will be complete by next semester. Revision of rules are in the making. There has been a change in the Sunday dress code, allowing girls to wear jeans slacks after 7:00 on Sunday. Also new hour changes to come into effect next semester are as follows:

A. All Junior and Senior women who are not on academic probation may date and/or be off campus Monday through Thursday

until 12:00 p.m. (midnight).

B. Second semester Freshmen and all Sophomore women who are not on academic probation may date and/or be off campus Monday through Thursday until 11:00 p.m.

C. All first semester Freshmen may date and/or be off campus Monday through Thursday until 10:00 p.m.

D. All Freshmen and Sophomore women who are not on academic probation may date and/or be off campus on Friday and Saturday nights until 12:00 midnight and Sunday nights until 11:00 p.m.

E. All Junior and Senior women who are not on academic probation may date and/or be off campus Friday and Saturday nights until 1:00 a.m. and Sunday nights until 12:00 midnight.

F. The five hour limit for Freshmen and Sophomores, and the seven hour limit for Juniors and Seniors is suspended as long as the girl or girls sign out properly. In signing out, the girl should state who she is going with, at the time she is leaving, where she is going and what time she will return.

G. These women students who are on academic probation be in their dorms one hour earlier than that stated above.

H. The Women's Affairs Board with the assistance of the House Council will agree to cover the hours for the above to work effectively.

This bill was passed by the Senate and will become effective at the beginning of the 1972 Spring semester.

CAMPUS SECURITY SERVES STUDENTS AND STAFF

Gardner-Webb College Campus Security department was established in the summer of 1970 and is operating for its second full school year this year.

Mr. Gordon Washburn is the chief security officer and has been with the department since the system was established. Mr. Washburn supervises the security of the buildings and grounds, and traffic control. He describes the purpose of the department to be "assisting any students or campus and aiding any visitors who might be on campus." He stressed the fact that the department was established as a service to students and staff of the college and that they are on call at all times.

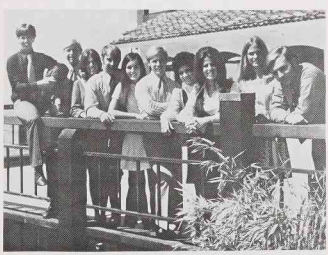
Mr. Paul Magall, night watchman for several years before Campus

Enrollment Down For Fall Semester

There are eighteen states and eight foreign countries represented in the 1450 member student body at Gardner-Webb.

North Carolina leads the list with 1020 students. South Carolina is second with 515. Virginia has 344 students, Florida 16, Georgia 14, Maryland 12, New Jersey 11, New York 5, Alabama 4, Tennessee 3, Delaware, Kentucky, and West Virginia have 2 represented each, and Hawaii, Illinois, Michigan, and Ohio have one each.

Lebanon leads the foreign countries with five students, Taiwan has two and Haiti, Hong Kong, India, Iran, Israel, and Venezuela have one each.

The total enrollment for the fall semester to date for the academic year 1971-72. There are 1450 students enrolled this year as compared to an enrollment of 1538 last year. This can be seen in the drop in the number of students from the home state, North Carolina brought 1070 students to Gardner-Webb last year as compared to 1010 this year.

Also there can be seen a change in the ratio of men to women. For the academic year 1970-71 there were 1068 men and 470 women as compared to an enrollment of 940 men this year and 510 women.

The story dealt with the three Kings arriving at the peasant hut of Amahl, a poor, crippled boy, and his mother. Climaxing in the miracle of Amahl's walking and leaving to give thanks to the Christ child, "Amahl" has been a traditional favorite since its television premiere in 1952.

Directed by Dr. Charles Cox and Mrs. Nettie Gidney and accompanied by Mr. Robert Reynolds, the opera featured Scott Haynes as Amahl, Susan Wilson as his mother, Paul McManus as Melchior, Hill Kelly as Caspar, and Ralph Glenn as the king. Supporting these roles was a cast of shepherds and also a group of dancers from Shelby.

GW Night School

With registration at 7:00 p.m. January 6, 1972, in the Hamrick Auditorium, Gardner-Webb College will extend a new branch of educational service. At this college level work will be offered to all citizens and around Cleveland County. Expectation is high for the success of the new Evening school which will run during the regular school year.

Currently, there are twenty-eight courses which have been approved and scheduled for the Evening program. Mr. Jesse Taylor, Director of the Evening school, has introduced a well rounded curriculum, which includes such various subjects as Business Law, Introduction to Libraries, and Librarianship, and Introduction to New Testament. Freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior level courses will also be taught in any group of sufficient number through the off-campus extension programs.

Starting times and days for the courses range between 6:00 and 7:00 p.m., Mondays through Thursdays depending on the length and nature of each individual class. Evening schedules may be secured through Mr. Taylor's office and they have also been added on the end of the regular second semester class schedules.

The advantages of the two services are numerous. They may serve as an introduction to the college level work for high school seniors, or persons who may be interested in continuing their education. They are of special value to those students and those who wish to receive teaching certificates or raise the level of their degrees.

Students who are already enrolled in the regular program at Gardner-Webb College and who are day students may also sign up for these Evening courses which are offered on campus. There will be no additional charges for taking these regular courses at night.
