Spring Jubilee Preview

Spring Jubilee is slated for April 28-29. The plans are indefinite but a Senate Committee chaired by Robert Cribb is scheduling the events.

Thursday night will begin the weekend activities with a concert. It is hoped to be an outdoor concert.

Friday night will involve the Spring Jubilee Ball with the format similar to last year's event. The dress for the occasion will be semi-formal and the ball will begin at 7:30 p. m. The highlight of the night will be the crowning of the Spring Jubilee Queen.

"Truth" a six piece dance band from Atlanta, Ga., will provide the music for the Spring Jubilee Ball.

Saturday, April 28 may bring a carnival to campus. This would involve the traditional cotton candy, candied apples and games. The plans for the campus carnival is only one idea being considered.

Saturday afternoon will include the traditional open dorms, and Saturday night will feature a concert. "True Direction," formerly Black and White is among the groups being considered.

The theme for Spring Jubilee 1973 has not been announced but it was revealed that the theme will revolve around the peace that has come to our country.

Festival of Christian Arts Features Philip Landgrave

Religious Emphasis Week will be held April 9-13 with the theme of "Faith, Art and Action" being emphasized through various forms of worship. The week will include an overview of Christianity and the creative arts.

Beginning the activities will be required chapel on Monday morning featuring Dr. Philip Landgrave. Dr. Landgrave has served as minister of music in several churches throughout Kentucky, Alabama and Georgia. A graduate of Emory University, he received his doctorate at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and has done post doctorate study at the Uni-

versity of California-Los Angeles. He is known for his sacred music compositions which include cantatas, folk musics, an oratorio, and some one hundred anthems, hymns, solos and instrumental works.

On Tuesday a contemporary worship service will be led by Dr. Landgrave in the Dover Memorial Chapel. The session on Tuesday morning is not a required chapel assembly. Celebrate Life, a musical drama with contemporary rhythms and sounds will be presented by the Student Volunteer Choir on Friday. Assisting Director Bob Decker will be faculty

members: Dr. C. Cox, Mr. Robert Reynolds, Dr. Sherman Parrish, and Dr. T. Furman Hewitt. Soloists will include Diane Allen, Cheryl Davis, Brenda Jones, Paul Lawrence and John Sutton. Instrumentalists are Debbie Griffin, flute; and Doug Jordan and Kenny Corn, guitar. Celebrate Life was composed by Burley Reed and Reagan Courtney.

On Thursday, a multi-media worship service using various audiovisuals will be featured during the chapel time. This will include worship through slides, lights music, motion pictures, spoken word, and banners. This is to be held in the Dover Chapel and attendance is optional.

The college ensemble will present a variety of music during the week in Bost Gymnasium.

Other program personalities will be Dr. James Hatley, pastor of the Second Baptist Church in Memphis, Tenn. Dr. Hatley is a denominational leader and a specialist in modern literature.

Reagan Courtney, an actor from New York will be on campus the week preceding religious emphasis week.

Art, drama and music are all part of the emphasis during the week. An art show featuring student presentations from North Carolina will be on exhibit throughout the week in the O. M. G. Fine Arts Building and the CID Lounge on Tuesday, April 10 there will be a judging and the presentation of an award.

The presentation of the drama "J.B." will be on Monday night, April 9 and a repeated performance on April 17. The drama will be presented in Hamrick Auditorium.

Chapel attendance will be required on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and attendance to evening sessions and morning conferences on Tuesday and Thursday will be optional.

Hansen and Jenkins To Be Honored

Graduation exercises will include the honoring of two outstanding men, Gene C. H. Hansen, Mack Truck executive, and the late Rev. James L. Jenkins, well known North Carolina educator and Baptist minister.

Mr. Hansen is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Mack Trucks Inc. and Rev. Jenkins who passed away Tuesday afternoon March 20, was a retired Baptist minister who once served three years as president of Gardner-Webb when it was Boiling Springs Junior College. Rev. Jenkins had retired in 1952 from the pastorate of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church after serving as pastor for more than 25 years.

Mr. Hansen joined Mack Trucks, Inc. in 1965 coming from the position of president of Diamond T Motor Company, a firm in which he was associated with for 15 years.

He was named president and a director of Mack Trucks, Inc. in 1965 and became chairman of the board and president in 1972. He was also chairman of the board and chief executive officer in 1972. He is also a director and member of the executive committee of the Signal Company, the parent company of Mack Trucks.

Mr. Hansen holds four honorary doctorates from colleges and universities in the country. He is a native of Hibbing, Minnesota. Mr. Hansen has a long and distinguished record in the field of trucks and also in service organizations.

He began his career with International Harvest Co. in 1927 and rose through the ranks to become a district manager in 1941. He then

joined Automotive Equipment Company as vice president in 1941.

He was named director of sales and vice president of Diamond T Motor Company in 1953 after which he joined Mack in 1955.

On May 13 the doctor of humanities degree will be presented to Mr. Hansen and the college will also honor him on April 2 which has been designated "Zemon Hansen Day."

Rev. Jenkins will also be honored at the spring commencement exercises. He was a native of Stanley County and is a graduate of Wake Forest College and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He served at various positions with Gardner-Webb three different times from 1928 until 1946. He also taught at Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute.

Rev. Jenkins served on many boards and commissions of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina while he served as a pastor in the state.

Applications For Publications Editors
