The colleges represented (besides Gardner-Webb) were Campbell, Chowan, Mars Hill, Meredith, and Wingate. Activities began with Registration from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. on Friday afternoon. The 6:30 p.m. dinner was held in the Faculty Dining Hall. Several speakers participated in the

banquet. Dr. E. Eugene Poston opened the program wel-coming the guests to Gardner-Webb. Next, Ione Kemp Knight, professor at Mere dith College, introduced the main speaker, Reverend Ed-ward Pruden, Pastor-In-Residence at Meredith. At the conclusion of his talk, every one moved into the Charles I. Dover Lounge to entertained by the Fine Arts Department of Gardner-Webb, which included a preentation of the one-act play, "Suppressed Desires."

The second lecture was presented by Mr. Ken Wolf-skill of Chowan College. His subject was the "Teaching of Frost's Stopping By Woods." Mr. Wolfskill analyzed the poem in many areas such as use of poetic devices, choice of words and point of view

The subject of the third lecture was "Teaching Marlowe's Dr. Faustus" and it was presented by Mr. Thomas Teer of Wingate Col-lege. Mr. Teer's humorous and entertaining lecture em phasized the universality of the themes of the seven deadly sins presented in Dr. Faustus
