Drayer Elected Assistant Editor

On the average, a semester hour's credit costs \$28.27, directly. With indirect costs averaging \$44.00 per semester hour, the total cost amounts to \$72.91 per semester hour.

Direct costs are defined as

the total cost for a fiscal year for instruction, fringe benefits that require cash contributions, supplies, equipment and travel divided by the number of semester hours taught by the department.

Indirect costs include the total cost of scholarships, library, administration, utilities, maintenance (everything not included in departmental budgets) divided by the number of semester hours taught by the institution.

\$50 per hour is charged for part-time students and tuition per hour for full-time students does not pay the total of \$72.91 per hour.

These figures are for the 1973-1974 school year.

Washburn Selected Security President

Mr. Gordon Washburn has been named President of the North Carolina Association of Campus Security Directors for 1975. He is also head of security on the Gardner-Webb campus. He was elected to the one-year position by his fellow members of the Association in January (1975).

The North Carolina Association of Campus Security Directors covers all campus security directors on all college and university campuses in North Carolina.

The Association's purposes are threefold. First, it wishes to promote ideals and standards for campus security to better serve the educational objectives of higher education in North Carolina. Second, it wishes to promote the professional development of members and all personnel under them. Finally,

it wishes to collectively represent campus security to the citizens of North Carolina in order to gain their understanding of campus security.

Mr. Washburn has been involved in preventive law enforcement for twenty years. For nine years, he worked in eastern North Carolina. The next six years, he worked for the town of Boiling Springs. He began his work at Gardner-Webb five years ago and has been here ever since.

Mr. Washburn feels strongly that all of the success in law enforcement lies in the cooperation between, and the working together of law officials and citizens. The key to efficient law enforcement is the prevention of crime rather than the seeking to find a solution after the crime is committed. Says Mr. Washburn, "I hope to continue our work in preventive security. This is, to work WITH young adults on campus and in the college community to prevent problems."

The new president is also very dedicated to working with the young people of the state as well as with the young people at Gardner-Webb and surrounding areas.

Presently, Mr. Washburn and his staff are promoting OPERATION IDENTIFICATION, a program which is designed to protect valuable items. The item is stamped with a tag bearing a number which can be traced if the valuable is stolen. Several other programs are being introduced into campus security which emphasize the working together of people.
