Gordon Washburn When came to Gardner-Webb College in 1970, the Department of Safety consisted of one , nightwatchman.

Sixteen years later, Washburn looks his creation, the Safety Depart-ont, with pride. Staffed with four at ment, with pride. Staffed with four full-time, certified police officers (one is also a Certified Emergency (one is also a Certified Emergency Medical Technician) and 14 part-time workers, the department is able to handle most any campus disturbance or problem.

Washburn says, Of his staff, would like to have a couple more peo-ple on the staff and hopefully time will allow that for us." He explains that although there is always someone there may not always be someon duty, on duty, there may one in the safety office. In case of companyon, a person can leave an emergency, a person can leave a message on the tape machine (which is monitored every twenty minutes or less) or call the Cleveland County Sheriff's Department, which will, in In case of Sheriff's Department, which will, in turn, notify the campus safety officer by radio. "I feel like we're cover-ed," says Washburn. "We've really seen big increases in staff."

Washburn attributes the growth of the Safety Department to the growth and expansion of the college. He and tells how a few years ago almost every student went home for the weekend. Now, however, with so many students on campus over the weekends, more campus over the weekends, mor supervision is a natural progression. High on Washburn's list of common campus troubles are traffic viola-tions, dorm disturbances, reported prowlers and disagreements between individuals. He does not feel that substance abuse is a widespread problem at Gardner-Webb. Rather, he says it is present on a very limited basis.

"I do not feel there has been an increase in drinking but I don't see a decrease either. It is limited here because we are constantly working at decreasing or eliminating it."

The department is also involved in the activities of the recently formed Drug "We and Alcohol Prevention Council. want people to be aware of the end result of alcohol and drug use," says the Safety Chief. "Usually we (the the Safety Chief. "Usually safety department) prefer to let the college handle problems with drugs and alcohol but we are now in a situation that requires us to enforce the new drinking laws. Because of these laws, The Safety Dept. is required to closely monitor the use of alcohol." He goes on to say that persons found in violation of the law will be arrested.

Dover Donates A Grand To College

On Tuesday, Sept. 30, West German pianist Stephan Moeller inaugurated College's new Steinway or a large and apprecia-Gardner-Webb Grand piano for a tive audience at the Kathleen N. Dover Theater.

The forty-thousand dollar instru-ment was donated to the school by Charles I. Dover in memory of his late wife, Kathleen N. Dover. Following the concert, Dr. Chris White, GWC presi-dent, gave a reception in honor of Dover's generous donation. The story behind Dover's donation

began this summer, when White, looking for ways to beautify the campus, noticed that there was no Grand piano in the Dover Theater. Knowing the college's musical heritage, the president told Dover of the need and as a fur-ther memorial to his wife, Dover financed the acquisition. Drs. Cribb and Billings helped select the piano at the Steinway factory in New York.

The piano was delivered to the college on Sept. 19 and the President and Dover were present for the installation. Eleven days later, both men were in the audience as it was Ware officially dedicated by Moeller.

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
