...lay up for yourselves treasure in heaven, so that God will be impressed. (Mt. 6:20)

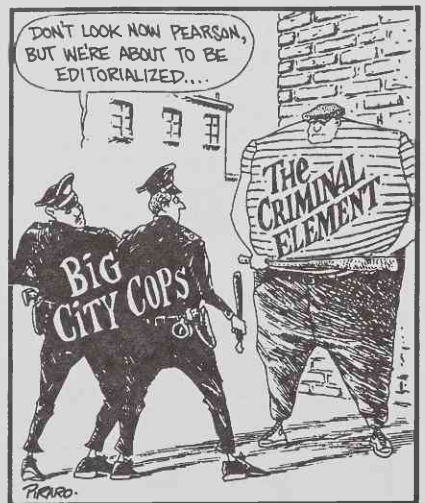
...any one who desires to be first must run to the front and break in line. (Mt. 20:27)
