

Bulldogs return in fighting mode

Hey sports fans, the Bulldogs are back and they are on a mission - a mission to maintain the national prominence which they achieved in last year's season.

The 1993 Running Bulldog football team is ranked 14th in the NCAA Division II preseason poll. Head Coach Woody Fish says that the team's attitude has improved because of such a high ranking.

"When you are at the top, there is no place to go but down," said Fish. "There is a tremendous pressure on us to succeed, and I feel this has made us a better team."

John Craven, a 6' 3", 250 lb, junior quarterback, returns to lead the Running Bulldog offense. He is a third year starter and was named NAIA National Player of the Year in 1992. Craven also led the nation in passing last year. He completed 307 of 506 passes for 4,089 yards and 37 touchdowns.

Craven set both school and conference records for pass attempts, completions, yards, touchdown's thrown, and total offense in 1992.

The bulldogs will again run the hybrid "run and shoot" offense which was responsible for 54 points and 20 new South Atlantic Conference records according to the '93 Bulldog Media Guide.

Having lost 10 seniors from last year's squad, the offense will undergo somewhat of a change, but that does not bother Bill Unsworth, offensive coordinator.

"Our young guys this year want to prove that they are as good, or even better, than last year's team," said Unsworth.

Last season, the offense out-scored their opponents by an average of over 27 points a game. Returning wide receivers Chris Gregory, Roderick Jeeter, and Steve Duncan hope to improve on that mark this year. "We have two goals for the season," said Unsworth. "We want to win ball games and to score within five plays."

Last season, the Bulldogs achieved these goals in each game. Another important aspect of the team's success will depend heavily on defense. The team has ranked in the top 10 the previous two seasons in that category. Having nine starters, including three All-Americans, returning this year is a plus for Scott Parker, defensive coordinator.

"We have a more mature, veteran defensive team this year," said Parker. " That has enabled us to concentrate more on improving our defense than actually coaching."

Three senior All-Americans will head the defense this year. Raymond Jennings, a 6' 3", 265 lb linebacker, Gabe Wilkins, a 6' 5" 285 lb. defensive end, and James Harbison, a 6' 1", 175 lb. defensive back, will try to continue the tradition of defensive excellence from year's past.

"Our primary goal is to win ball games," said Parker.

The Bulldog's open their season September 11 at Lees McRae and will be at home September 25 against Newberry College.

"How well we play against Lees McRae will set the tone for the entire season," said Fish. "Our goal is to come out, play well, and hopefully come away with a victory."
