Also, John Brock has been promoted from Director of Marketing to Vice President of Marketing. Brock will be in charge of overseeing the streamlining and integration of all the admissions process. Working with him is Buddy Freeman, promoted from Associate Director of Admissions to Dean of Admissions and Financial Planning.

"The primary purpose of the restructuring is to make the admissions process much easier on the student trying to get into one of the programs here at Gardner-Webb," says Durham. "We want to make it as easy as possible for them and for us. and we feel that this will help us in both aspects."
