

Gardner-Webb won three of four games, which included victories over Limestone 11-3, Barton 11-6 and Augusta State 7-6. Kerryanne Rishko pitched her way to a 2-0 record during the tournament while Tina Mitchum picked up one win. Against Augusta State, Wendy White went four for five at the plate while knocking in five runs. In the

Barton game, Mary Kirkman went three for four and Heather Price was two for three with two runs scored. The Lady Bulldogs traveled to Pfeiffer College on March 13 and split a doubleheader with the Falcons. GWU dropped the first game 2-5, and won the second by a score of 3-1. In the loss, Becky Reuter was two for three with a run. In the win, Tina Mitchum allowed only one earned run and four hits over eight innings. Reuter was two for four with a double and a stolen base. Angie Blair went two for four with a stolen base and a run-batted-in.
