White said, "This building will have locker rooms for the players, offices for the coaches, and an indoor batting cage for the players to hit in.'



> Hauser had a team-high 10 kills, while King led the defensive effort with 8 digs and 5 blocks. Fick recorded 28 assists in her final match.

Ramseur, Hauser and Fick were named first-team all-conference, and King was placed on the second team. Ramseur was also named player-of-theyear, becoming only the second player in Gardner-Webb history to receive this honor. Head coach Angell Benson was named coach-of-the-year for the second time in her four year career. Hauser and Fick were named statistical leaders in digs per game and assists per game, respectively. The team also received awards for leading the conference in statistical categories including hitting percentage, kills per game, assists per game and digs per

Gardner-Webb finished the season at 42-4, the best mark in school history and one of the best records in the nation. Their 32-game win streak may well be the longest in the country this year. Benson attributed the team's success to their depth and sense of unity.

We were a lot deeper team this year than we have been in the past, and the team was very cohesive. We played with lots of confidence. Whenever the girls stepped on the court, they had no doubt that they would win, Benson said.
