Medea

C&C Invades Drama Field

Theater '63, which is a channel of the C and C program, plans to present on March 6-8th the original Greek version of the tragic drama, *Medea*.

Directed by Mr. Arthur McDonald, the play relates the ancient myth of the barbarian princess coming to Greece as the war bride of Jason, who has met her when going in search of the Golden Fleece. Soon after the couple arrive in Greece, Jason (Preston Stone) rejects Medea (Anne Brong). The remainder of the play deals with her horror and reaction to his rejection.

To add emphasis to the play a chorus consisting of Dorothy McCory, Susan Dillingham, Anne Blumhort, Donnie Rankin, and Lucylle Crook will be used in the traditional Greek style of antiphonal response.

Medea will be open to the public free of charge. Those attending will be enlightened by the talents of the "kings" of Corinth and Athens played by Paul Grubbs and Gordon Cleveland. The other members of the cast include Bob Zeh as tutor, Lillian Phillips as nurse, and John Burch as a messenger.

Director McDonald has invited others who wish to work on costume or scenery committees to contact him personally.

The student body is urged to take advantage of the cultural opportunities offered by the school and to make every effort to attend the projects undertaken by the various departments.

String Quartet Next In Concert-Lectures

The Alabama Quartet is the Quartet-in-Residence at the University of Alabama. This group performs some forty performances each year, which include appearances throughout Alabama as well as several short tours of other states.

Emil Raab, the First Violinist was formerly a member of the Stanley Quartet of the University of Michigan. He is also the conductor of the University Symphony Orchestra. The Second violinist, Frank Spinosa, has been a member of the New Orleans and St. Louis Symphony Orchestra and last summer was "Visiting Artist in Music" at the University of Illinois.

The Violist, Henry Barrett, studied Chamber Music with the Juilliard Quartet and Orchestral Techniques with Anshel Brusilow. His summer activities have included performances with the Aspen Festival Orchestra.

Margaret Christy, Cellist, has recently completed studies with Pablo Casals. During the summer she teaches cello at the Transylvania Music Camp and serves as principal cellist of the Brevard Festival Orchestra.

Faculty Recital Scheduled For Sunday, February 24

John E. Williams, Associate Professor of Organ, will give his faculty recital on Feb. 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Laurinburg. This will be the first recital given on the new three-manual Austin organ since its dedication in October. The organ was designed and dedicated by Dr. Harry Cooper of Meredith College.

Mr. Williams holds the Bachelor of Music degree from Oberlin College, Conservatory of Music degree from the University of Michigan. He has studied in England at the Royal School of Church Music on a Fulbright scholarship and on a Presbyterian Church U.S. scholarship he studied with Charles Letestu in Hamburg, Germany.

Professor Williams is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. His interest in dramatics while in college led to his acceptance into Alpha Psi Omega, the National Honorary Dramatic Fraternity.

In 1952 Mr. Williams was national finalist in the Young Or-

ganist Contest sponsored by the American Guild of Organists. Since then Mr. Williams has served in several capacities in the American Guild of Organists and has also served as music book reviewer for the Presbyterian survey.

During the Second World War Mr. Williams served in the Intelligence Division of SHAEF, headquarters of Major General Dwight D. Eisenhower. Mr. Williams was a recipient of the Bronze Star.

Summer jobs in Europe are now available to almost every college student. The American Student Information Service, known as ASIS, has more than 3000 summer jobs in their files awaiting applicants. In the past four years ASIS has successfully placed thousands of American college students in various summer jobs throughout 11 European countries.

Jobs are mostly unskilled and many do not require a knowledge of a foreign language. Monthly wages range from room and board in Spain to \$150 for the highest paid positions in West Germany.

Jobs include factory work, resort work, construction work, farm work, hospital work, child care, camp counselling positions
