Seniors To Receive Who's Who Honors

Ballots for selection of nominees to Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges have been distributed and are to be completed and turned in to the Office of Student Affairs between 1:00-5:00 p.m. Friday Oct. 11 or 9:00-12:00 Saturday, October 12. Each student, faculty, and administrative official may nominate up to 12 outstanding SENIORS. While the ballots need not be signed, each person voting must record his name when his ballot is turned in.

Guides for helping one make his choices of who is who among students at St. Andrews are included on the reverse side of the ballot. Each choice is to be rated from 0-4 by the voter to indicate his judgment of the relative strength of the particular nominee as to the following qualities:

- The nominee's leadership and performance in academic and extracurricular activities.
- The nominee's prominence as a responsible citizen in this campus community.
- The nominee's potential as a leader in society after graduation.

A joint student-faculty committee made up of Miss Gloria Blanton, Barbara Gaw, Mr. Robert Gustafson, and Johnny Phillips will rank the several nominees presented by members of the student body, the faculty, and the administration in keeping with the criteria and maximum quota established by the Tuscaloosa office of Who's Who. Final certification of nominees from St. Andrews to that office will be given by Deans Davidson and Hester in consideration of the Who's Who committee recommendations.

A list of seniors in good standing has been distributed with each ballot, and each senior on the

list is eligible for nomination to our Who's Who committee; however, seniors who have academic averages below "B" should not expect serious consideration by the committee or the certifying officials unless other ratings suggest unusual strength.

Careful judgment by each student, faculty, and staff voter in appraising each nominee's strength in leadership participation and potential, then, become extremely important considerations.

Official announcement of approved nominees accepted by the Tuscaloosa office of Who's Who will be made during early spring in THE LANCE and at a student body dinner honoring each Who's Who Among Students and St. Andrews the evening following the news release. The freshman class, as in the past, will serve as hosts and hostesses for the dinner.

SAPC Competes In North State College Bowl

St. Andrews will be one of ten colleges participating this year in the North State Student Government Association "College Bowl". The idea of having a "college-bowl" among NSSGA members was discussed last year at the NSSGA spring conference, and rules were drawn up for such a contest at this time.

The purpose of the "college-bowl" contest is both to encourage academic competition among the colleges of NSSGA and to familiarize college students with this organization. The colleges that St. Andrews will be competing against either directly or indirectly are: Appalachian, Elon, Catawba, Pfeiffer, High Point, Guilford, Atlantic Christian, Western Carolina, and Lenoir Rhyne.

Preceding the start of the "college-bowl," questions will be composed by professors from all the member schools of NSSGA.

A contest will consist of two twenty-minute sessions with a short break between them, and the host school will select the moderator. In every round but the final round, each set of competing schools will meet two times in order to determine the winner of their set. Points are acquired by answering questions correctly, and at the end of a set the school with the highest number of accumulated points will be the winner.

St. Andrews' first opponent is Atlantic Christian College. A date for the contest has not been set as yet.

Concert Series To Present Quintet



The Dorian Quintet, one of the most acclaimed woodwind ensembles in this country and abroad, will be presented here as the first of the Concert-Lecture Series, Monday, October 21, at 8:00 in the National Guard Armory. Their program features not only standard but also contemporary works.

The concert will open with Divertimento in B Flat by Joseph Haydn. Following this will be Anton Reicha's Quintet, Op. 88 No. 1, Beethoven's Quintet, Op. 71 in E Flat Major, and Paul Hindemith's Kleine Kammermusik for Woodwind Quintet.

The five members of the quintet are: John Perras, flute; Charles Kuskin, oboe; William Lewis, clarinet; William Brown, French horn, and Jane Taylor, Bassoon.

The group was organized in April, 1961, and made its New York debut in the following October. One year later the Dorians made a five week tour of Europe. They participated in the International Contemporary Music Festival in Warsaw.

Mr. Lambert serves as the director of music at the Highland Presbyterian Church where his wife also serves as organist. For interest it might be noted that Mr. Lambert studied under Radina Pazmore of this year's conservatory faculty. All students and faculty members interested are invited to attend.

The subject of the morning talk is "Finding Real Freedom," and the overall theme for the three evening sermons is "Doubt, Faith, and Obedience." The individual subjects for the evening sermons are:

Wednesday - "Dealing With Doubt"

Thursday - "Just As I Am, I Come"

Friday - "The Struggle of the Church to Be the Church"

Dr. Evans is a native of Laurinburg, and attended the public schools here. He was graduated from Woodbury Forest, Davidson College, and Union Theological Seminary, and his graduate work was taken at Yale and at New College, University of Edinburgh, Scotland.

Before going to Auburn, Dr. Evans served for one year as the campus pastor at the Citadel. He was later Assistant Professor of Bible and Religion at Davidson. His wife is the former Margaret Thornhill Wier, and they have five children.

Dr. Evans has said that he is looking forward to being at St. Andrews, and hopes to have the opportunity to visit with many of the students individually.
