Lamp And Shield Sponsor Contest

The third annual Miss Lamp and Shield beauty pageant will be held Saturday night at 8 o'clock in the liberal arts auditorium. The contest, sponsored by the LAMP AND SHIELD staff, will consist of twenty-seven lovely girls chosen earlier by secret ballot votes of the dormitories. Mr. Robert Gustafson will be master of ceremonies, and St. Andrews students will provide entertainment. Bobbie Jean Gant, Miss Charlotte 1963; Miss Marsha Winslow, fashion designer from Charlotte, N. C.; James Martin, math professor of St. Andrews; Roy Cashion, president of the Sanford Jaycees; and Miss Betsy McNeill of Laurinburg will be the judges for the contest. After being judged on beauty and poise, the number of contestants will be reduced to five girls, who will answer the determining questions. Margaret Price, Miss Lamp and Shield of 1963 will crown the new winner. A general admission fee of fifty cents will be charged.

Highland Players To Present Williams' 'Summer And Smoke'

The Highland Players will present Tennessee Williams' "Summer and Smoke" under the direction of Professor Thomas Johnson December 11, 12, and 13 in the Liberal Arts Auditorium. "Summer and Smoke" was first presented in New York in 1948

by Margo Jones. Three years ago it was shown as a movie starring Geraldine Page and Lawrence Harvey. The play deals with the struggle of two young people to find themselves and the conflict between their outlooks on love and life. The setting is a small southern town before the First World War.

Carolyn Clark portrays Miss Alma, the minister's daughter, who is in love with John Buchanan, a young doctor, portrayed by Bob Shaffner. Having to assume the responsibilities of a minister's wife because of her mother's illness, Alma has been deprived of a normal social life and has been accused of putting on airs.

John, first finishing medical school, spends his time drinking, gambling, and running around with a risqué woman instead of helping his father with his practice.

Howard Cobbs and Harriett Otten play the roles of Rev. and Mrs. Winemiller, Alma's parents. Bob Parkman plays Dr. Buchanan, John's father, and Barbara Bolton portrays Rosa Gonzales, a hussy who plays for John's affections. Dave Johnson acts as Rosa's father.

Other actors in "Summer and Smoke" are Barbi Irby, Bob Bercaw, Heath Rada, Helen Gregory, Florence Girard, John Marion, and Jerry Hurst.

Tickets for the production are seventy-five cents for students and one dollar for adults. They will be on sale in the Student Center Building.

Season ticket holders should call extension nine before 5 p.m. to make reservations for "Summer and Smoke."

Susan Bridges will assist Professor Johnson with the production.
