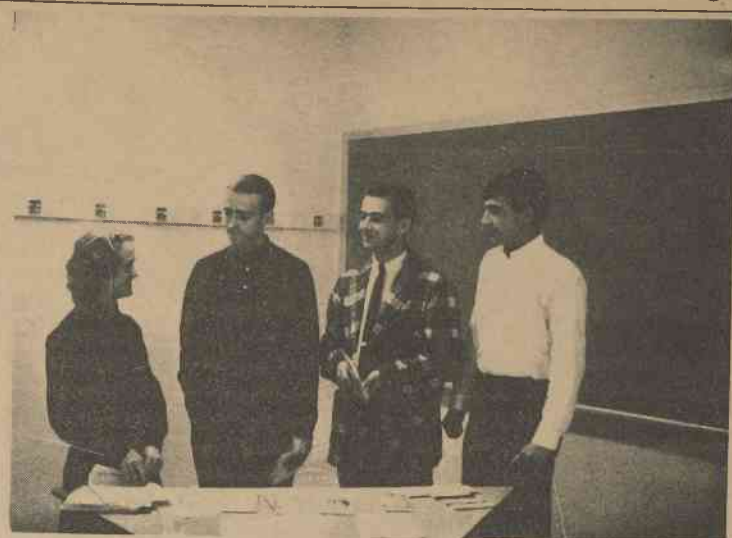
The group discussion will include the ways in which membership drives, programs, and projects are carried out by the SNCEA at Pfeiffer.

The majors meet two to three times a month to investigate job openings and discuss problems of the field.



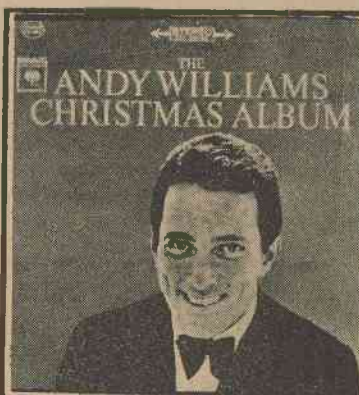
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
