Heavenly Tavern (a bar) is the setting and it is filled with an array of unusual people. Runner (Walter Barefoot) is a distraught young college fellow who can find no place in society for himself. He is comforted by the patrons of the bar— Mary (Rebecca Carter), Joseph (Jerry Hurst), Rev. Conform (Steve Pitt), Jeremiah (Beverly McClure), and Bartender (Al Thomas). (Dwight Bayley).

Doris And Franklin West Present Faculty Recitals

Doris and Franklin West will be presented in faculty recital Friday, March 20, 1964, by the St. Andrews Presbyterian College Conservatory of Music. The recital will be in the Liberal Arts Auditorium at 8 p.m.

Mrs. West is presently instructor in strings. She received her Bachelor of Music at Converse College.

Mr. West is director of the Conservatory of Music and associate professor of music at St. Andrews Presbyterian College. He is director of the St. Andrews summer music camp and director of the St. Andrews Orchestra.

Previously, he was director of music for the Belmont, N.C., public schools, conductor of the band and orchestra at Davidson College, and conductor of the Piedmont Youth Orchestra.

West received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of North Carolina and his Master of Music degree from Indiana University. He is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, honorary

music fraternity, the American Symphony Orchestra League, College Band Directors National Association, and the North Carolina Music Educators Conference.

The first part of the recital will be played by Mr. West on the English Horn. It opens with "Rhapsody" by Gordon Jacob, followed by "Shepherds' Song" from "Tristan and Isolde" - Wagner, and "Einsame Blumen" - Schumann.

The second part of the recital will be performed by Mrs. West on the violin and Mr. West on the English horn. The numbers include "Trio Sonata" - "Andante" - "Allegro" - Bach; and "Pastorale" - Geoffrey Robbins.

The last number on the recital will be "Sonata in A Major" by Brahms, followed by several short numbers that have not been announced. These will be performed by Mrs. West, Mr. and Mrs. West will be accompanied by Dr. Herbert Horn, associate professor of piano.



Bennett To Study In India On Grant

Dr. Carl D. Bennett has been awarded one of twenty Fulbright grants to attend a 1964 summer institute at the University of Mysore, India.

This "Institute in Indian Civilization" gives a brief, intensive survey of India's history, institutions, and culture. It will be conducted from late June through August and will include some travel within India.

The program is designed for professors at the undergraduate level, with special consideration for colleges which are developing or improving courses in Asian studies.

For the past year, Dr. Bennett has been on the junior teaching team in Christianity and Culture. The junior course covers African and Asian studies.

Kilenyi Conducts Piano Workshop

The Edward Kilenyi Piano Workshop was held here March 9-11. The workshop opened with a recital Monday night by Mr. Kilenyi in the Liberal Arts Auditorium. The program included 32 Variations in C Minor, Sonata in E Major Op. 81a—Beethoven; Two Rhapsodies — Brahms; Four Etudes, Op. 25—Chopin; three numbers by Bartok; and three numbers by Dohnanyi.

Tuesday morning the workshop covered the Baroque period and in the afternoon the classic sonatas and the Romantic period. Wednesday morning works of the contemporary period were covered.

Mr. Kilenyi is now professor of music at Florida State University. He is considered to be one of the finest piano teachers in the United States today.

SA Student Synod Moderator

Beverly McClure of St. Andrews was elected to the post of moderator for the Synod of North Carolina Westminster Fellowship at last weekend's spring conference.

Beverly will step up to the highest student office in the Synod from this year's service as vice-moderator. She has been active in other religious groups and was a delegate this year to a National Student Christian Federation convention.

A dozen other St. Andrews members of WF attended the two-day meeting, and presented a paper on "The Church's Mission on a Church-Related Campus."

Other papers on campus issues (race, peace, sex, and the church) were discussed in committees and then in general session.

Jim Walkup of Davidson College was chosen as vice-moderator for the coming year. Others will be Doris Sherrill of North Carolina College as stated clerk and Harvey George of University of North Carolina at Raleigh as editor of THE CHALLENGE, the Synod newspaper.

New Speed Limit Signs On Two Campus Roads

New 35 mile per hour speed limit signs have been placed along the two roads leading into the campus. Officer Mac Morgan has requested that all persons who operate automobiles on or around the campus obey this speed law.

Dr. Hester Gains Extra Position

Dr. Ralph Hester, Dean of Students, has been elected president of the College Personnel section of the North Carolina Personnel and Guidance Association. Dr. Hester was elected at a meeting held Feb. 29 - Mar. 1 in Durham.

Theme for the meeting was "Personnel and Service—Directions and Goals."

Dr. Dugald Arbuckle of Boston College delivered the main address, "Existentialism — It's Meaning for Counsel."

Dr. Louis Pope, associate professor of psychology at St. Andrews, also attended the meeting. Dr. Pope participated in a discussion of the gap between high school and college.

The Association is composed of counselors and guidance workers from colleges, high schools, and preparatory schools.

These roads are owned by the city of Laurinburg and thus are subject to the jurisdiction of the city law enforcement officers.

The boundaries of the new speed zone extend from the intersection across from the Gulf station through the traffic circle down to the guidance center building, and also from the circle north to the intersection with Main Street.

Speed limits on other roads around the campus range from 40 miles per hour on the straight portions to 20 miles per hour in the areas around buildings and parking lots.

Officer Morgan reports that there have been a number of times when he has observed drivers exceeding the 40 mile per hour limit and he issues a special request that drivers slow down on these straight stretches.

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
