Mecklenburg 1 Takes Football Championship

The championship game of this seasons intramural football was played this past Tuesday, October 27. A tight defensive first half broke open in the final moments of play, placing the Little Animals on top 19 to 6 over the Animals.

a hard low kickoff which placed the Animals on their own fifty yard line. On the fifth down of their series Charley Hughes passed to Rick Young up the middle. Young then flipped the touchdown pass to Rick LeGrand which ended the game.

"We were lucky to win; they played a good game," was Taylor last comment. Jim Moore in affirmation said, "I said earlier that the team that beat us would win the championship, and they did."

Once again Larry Taylor is to be recognized for his outstanding performance. Because of his aggressiveness both on offense and defense, Rick Young was selected the outstanding player for the Animals in this championship game.
